

Genus-species:Juncus ensifoliusAuthority:Wikstr., 1823Subordinate taxa:-Synonyms and authority:-Common name:iris-leaved rushSection:IridifoliiThreat status (2012):Naturalised

NZ distribution: Rotorua and Pureora south to Westland and Canterbury

Habitat: Swampy roadsides and riverine wetlands.

Identification features: An upright blue-green, loosely tufted rush growing up to 70 cm tall with long creeping rhizomes. **Leaves:** flattened and iris-like (sword-shaped), with prominant vertical and horizontal veins. **Flower heads:** 1 to 3 large spherical shaped flowerheads made up of many dark-brown to black flowers/capsules. **Capsules:** ~3 mm long, oblong and dark brown to black. **Tepals:** shorter than the length of capsules.

Similar species: *J. prismatocarpus* which has many-branched flower heads with green or pink flower clusters and tends to be more clump forming.
